How to Use the Activities

Print out the three activity sheets and the family take-home letter. Children will need markers or crayons for the activities. Help children by reading each activity sheet to them.

Activity 1

The Good Pirate Code

Explain to the children that Santiago is an 8-year old boy who lives on an island called Isla Encanto with his mother, grandfather, and his pet frog, Kiko. He spends time with his cousin Tomás and their friend, Lorelai, a mermaid who can turn into a girl. When Santiago discovers the treasure of Capitán Calavera, a fabled Good Pirate of the High Seas, he becomes a pirate protector who lives by the Good Pirate Code.

Have children share their ideas about pirates and what it might mean to be a "good pirate." Affirm

children's ideas that a good pirate is kind and helps others. Explain that Santiago's mission is to protect treasures and make sure that the island, its people, animals, and traditions are safe from danger.

Santiago lives by the Good Pirate Code. A good pirate should always stand by their mates (friends) and always do what's right.

Guide a conversation to help children think about what kinds of behaviors and manners could be in Santiago's Good Pirate Code and how they might be similar to classroom rules or to their interactions with family members and friends. Use these ideas to support the conversation. Explain that in the show, you will hear common words in Spanish such as the ones on the activity sheet. You might also write some of these traits on chart paper:

- Good pirates are: kind, respectful, polite, inclusive, and helpful.
- Good pirates say: "please," (por favor); "thank you," (gracias) "you're welcome," (de nada); "I'm sorry," (lo siento) and "excuse me" (disculpe).
- Good pirates do: look out for others, take turns.
- Good pirates do not: tell lies, interrupt, or exclude others.

Distribute the activity sheet. In Part 1, tell children Santiago wants to teach them some words and phrases of the Good Pirate Code. Review the featured words and ask children to give examples of how to use them to practice the Good Pirate Code at school or at home. Provide a structure to help children respond, such as, "I can be kind when I ____," or "I say 'thank you' when someone ____."

In Part 2, have the children draw a picture of themselves on the back of the sheet or separate paper doing something that reflects a trait or action from the Good Pirate Code.

Activity Extension: Encourage children to imagine how Santiago would uphold the Good Pirate Code on an adventure the class creates.

Activity 2 Ocean Friends

To start, tell children that in *Santiago of the Seas*, there are mermaids in the sea, in addition to real animals. Ask children to name real animals that live in the ocean or sea.

Then distribute the activity sheet. Remind children that Santiago's friend, Lorelai, is a mermaid. Have them point to the bracelet Lorelai is

wearing. Explain that her bracelet has magical powers that allow her to change into a girl and back to a mermaid.

Ask children to predict how Lorelai's magical powers, along with her ability to communicate with ocean animals, could help Santiago as the protector of his island and his people. Next, help children count, in English and in Spanish, the different ocean animals shown on the activity sheet and record the correct numerals on the blank lines. Children may use the numbers at the bottom of the activity sheet for guidance to form the numerals. Conclude by having them color the activity sheet.

Activity Extension: Help children count the total number of ocean animals featured on the activity sheet. Then ask them to imagine they are one of these animals. How would they move? Help children develop playful body movements and gestures that represent each animal and share them.

Activity 3

A Secret Map

For this activity, you will need a small item to serve as "treasure," for example, a pretend coin, beaded necklace, etc., and a cut-out paper X.

Before introducing the activity, hide the "treasure" somewhere in the room with the paper X by it, and prepare a series of clues that will lead to the hidden treasure.

Mark a spot where you want the children to begin. If working with a group, have the children take turns to seek the treasure by having them follow directions based on the series of clues you prepared. For example, the first child will begin at the starting point, then take three steps around the bookshelf. The next child will trade places while the first child sits back down. The second child might follow your direction to walk sideways three steps, and so on, until everyone has had a turn and the hidden treasure is found. Have children share their thoughts about this experience. What was fun? What was challenging? How did they help or encourage one another? How did this encouragement feel, etc.

Distribute the activity sheet. Explain to the children that maps are important for pirate adventures and finding lost treasures. Read the directions and then have the children count the footprints and write the number on the line.


Activity Extension: Have children brainstorm what they think is in the treasure Santiago and his mates find. Then explain that Santiago records adventures such as finding a treasure in the journal of Capitán Calavera. What type of stories might be in a good pirate's journal — a pirate who is polite, kind, inclusive, and helpful? Have children work together to draw their own good pirate adventure story.

Family Take-Home Letter

We encourage you to send copies of this letter home or email it so that families can continue to sail the seas of learning fun together with Santiago and his faithful crew.




Ocean Friends

Dear Parents and Caregivers/ Estimados padres y cuidadores:

Santiago of the Seas, the new interactive action-adventure series from Nickelodeon, invites you and your preschooler to set sail on exciting learning adventures! This fun series follows the exploits of Santiago “Santi” Montes, a courageous and kind 8-year-old boy who lives with his Abuelo (grandfather) and Mami on the mystical Isla Encanto.

The adventure begins when Santiago discovers the magical treasure of Capitán Calavera, a fabled Good Pirate of the High Seas, and becomes the new good pirate protector of his island home. Soon, together with his guitar-playing cousin, Tomás, his pet tree frog, Kiko, and Lorelai, a mermaid who can change into a girl, Santiago sets sail aboard El Bravo, Calavera’s enchanted pirate ship, to outsmart the villains who threaten Isla Encanto and uphold the Good Pirate Code.

Try out these learning activities and conversations inspired by *Santiago of the Seas* to engage your child at home!



- Santiago has a pet frog called Kiko and Lorelai has a pet octopus named Cecilia. What other animals would make fun pets for a good pirate and crew?
- Santiago is pirate protector of his island home. Ask your child what they think is exciting about being a good pirate who protects people and goes on adventures. What might be difficult about the job?
- The show takes place in Isla Encanto, a fictional, Caribbean-inspired location. Look at a map and identify the countries in the Caribbean.
- Create your own good pirate adventure story together as a family. Start by naming your characters, describing the setting where your story will take place, and thinking of a problem the characters have to solve. Then let your imaginations set sail! Take turns adding to the story. Have your child draw pictures of your story.
- Santiago follows the Good Pirate Code. He is kind, respectful, polite, inclusive, and helpful. He never lies. He takes turns, says “please” and “thank you,” and does not interrupt others. He looks out for others. Ask your child for examples of how your family can follow the Good Pirate Code.
