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PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- To explore the universal themes of personal growth, loss, grief, and acceptance portrayed in the new film *The Lovely Bones*.
- To enhance understanding of the many ways people deal with death and the task of moving forward.

HOW TO USE THIS PROGRAM

Display the wall poster to introduce the program and generate student interest. Review, photocopy, and distribute a set of the reproducible activity sheets to each student.

ACTIVITY ONE COMING OF AGE

This activity focuses on the characteristics of a coming-of-age story. Encourage students to research and discuss other protagonists who make this transformation in novels, movies, or other art (for example, Holden Caulfield in *The Catcher in the Rye* or Gordie Lachance in *Stand by Me*). After they have seen *The Lovely Bones*, ask students to discuss the varying ways Susie, her sister, her brother, and even her parents come of age.

ACTIVITY TWO A FAMILY IN CRISIS

Begin this activity by leading students in a general discussion about the dynamics of a distressed family. Use the character descriptions to encourage close-reading skills as students deduce which family members exhibit the emotions outlined in the web diagram. After they have seen *The Lovely Bones*, ask students to take on the roles of particular characters to better understand the different emotions each character experiences.

ACTIVITY THREE LESSONS IN LOSS

The Lovely Bones is a revealing portrait of the many ways people cope with grief and loss. In this activity, students will take the role of grief counselor or close family friend and try to console members of the Salmon family. After viewing **The Lovely Bones**, they will use their new perspective to predict how the Salmon family will go forward.

ACTIVITY ONE COMING OF AGE

Based on the critically acclaimed best-selling novel by Alice Sebold, and directed by Oscar® winner Peter Jackson (*The Lord of the Rings* trilogy), *The Lovely Bones* centers on a young girl, Susie Salmon, who has been murdered and watches over her family—and her killer—from heaven. She must weigh her desire for vengeance against her need for her family to heal.

The Lovely Bones is a coming-of-age story, which means that adolescent characters mature in some way—either by taking responsibility or learning a lesson. In most societies, the teen and early adulthood years are traditionally associated with coming-of-age rituals and lessons. But in **The Lovely Bones**, even the adults learn that coming of age is a lifelong process as they deal with death, justice, and the differing paths to peace.



PARTA Coming-of-age stories have similar characteristics. For example, most protagonists go through a period of physical or emotional separation from family members. Or, they begin to challenge an adult's teaching. Begin this activity by brainstorming a list

of coming-of-age novels and films with which you are familiar. Consider what characteristics the stories have in common. Do the characters have similar experiences and emotions? Are there similarities in what the characters learn on their journey to maturity?

PART B. After viewing *The Lovely Bones*, consider the following in a class discussion:

- How do Susie's interactions with family members, although mystical, facilitate the coming-of-age theme?
- How are the supporting characters used as agents in Susie's own progress and development? Include in your discussion Susie's mother, who finds many ways

to escape her now tragic life; Jack, Susie's guilt-ridden father; Lindsey, Susie's sister, who wants justice yet also wants to go on with her life; and her grandmother who feels compelled to move in with the family and help out.

 Are any of the characters going through transitions like Susie's, and if so, how do Susie's experiences differ from theirs?

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ACTIVITY TWO A FAMILY IN CRISIS

The Lovely Bones is the saga of the Salmon family torn apart by the untimely and tragic death of Susie Salmon. The story traces the lives of each member of the family—including Susie—and shows how each person deals with the repercussions of a devastating loss, both as individuals and as a family.

PARTA. Get to know the Salmons and their struggle to cope with Susie's death. Read the descriptions of the main characters in *The Lovely Bones* provided below. Then use the terms provided (or your own terms) to create a web diagram showing each family member's emotional connection to the tragedy that has shattered their lives. One spoke of the diagram has been filled in to help you get started.

When **Susie Salmon**, age 14, dies as the result of a crime, she leaves behind a grieving mother, father, and younger sister and brother, whom she watches over from heaven. As she struggles to accept death and leave her lost life behind, she observes the sorrow, anger,

and confusion that consume her family. She desperately wants her family to find peace and go forward with their lives.

Susie's father **Jack** is consumed with guilt over not having been able to protect his daughter. He remains on extended leave from work, increasingly isolating himself at home. He won't give up trying to solve the crime.

Susie's mother **Abigail** cannot deal with both her own grief and the sorrow of her family. She moves to California, leaving her children in the care of her husband and their grandmother.

Susie's sister **Lindsey** is a year younger than Susie. She wants justice for Susie but also wants her old life back.

Susie's young brother **Buckley** is 10 years younger than Susie. He takes comfort knowing she is in the "in-between."

Susie's **Grandma Lynn** comes to live with the Salmon family after Abigail leaves. She feels family members need her to keep them moving forward.

After you've completed the web diagram, use the results to examine the forces that hold the family together and pull them apart. Have a class discussion about how the characters and their respective roles in the family dynamic might intensify or calm the family's stress and willingness to move forward.

EMOTIONAL CONNECTIONS



PARTB After viewing *The Lovely Bones*, break into small groups and discuss how the film depicted each family member's emotional state. To gain a better understanding of each character's response to Susie's death, your group should select one family member and develop a defense of his or her reaction and eventual resolution.

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ACTIVITY THREE LESSONS IN LOSS

Death is a tragedy that affects us all. We must all learn to cope with loss. In *The Lovely Bones*, Susie and her family learn this lesson in different ways. While one person accepts the loss, another is determined to avenge it. While one tries to pretend it never happened, another feels compelled to solve the crime.

Elisabeth Kübler-Ross identified five stages of coping with loss in her famous 1969 book, On Death and • Dying—denial, anger, bargaining, depression, and acceptance—providing a basic description of the grieving process that is still in use today. Do some research to learn more about these "stages of grief." Then read the character descriptions below and decide which stage you think each member of the Salmon family is experiencing. Finally, pretend that you are a psychologist counseling the Salmon family through their loss. What advice would you give each family member?

Susie's mother, **Abigail**, becomes reclusive after Susie dies. She cannot cope with simple daily tasks. Her sadness encompasses her immobilizes her and tŀ
