

INTRODUCTION

This program is a free in-school program designed to reinforce the lessons presented in *The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything – A VeggieTales Movie*, presented by Big Idea, Inc. and Universal Pictures and scheduled for theatrical release January 11, 2008.

Larry the Cucumber joins the pirates Pa Grape and Mr. Lunt to star as Elliot, George, and Sedgewick. The movie opens inside a dinner theater where the three characters play cabin boys and wait tables. Each cabin boy dreams of being a hero in the theater's hit pirate play but all are afraid to try out for a part. Larry fears so many things that he has a list to keep track of them all; Sedgewick spends his time making labor-saving devices to avoid doing work; and George has such low self-esteem that he finds it difficult to stand up for himself. One night after the show, a blind man approaches the cabin boys with a mysterious message for each one. The three misinterpret the messages and think it is time to try out for the show. The tryouts end in disaster; the restaurant is ruined and the cabin boys are fired. That's when the mysterious ball called a Helpseeker descends on them and changes their lives forever. With the press of a button, the cabin boys and wannabe pirates are taken back in time where they experience a real-life adventure. Along the way, they learn what it means to be a real hero.

The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything find themselves on a ship with Princess Eloise whose brother, Alexander, has been kidnapped by their evil uncle, Robert the Terrible. An envious and selfish man, Robert the Terrible covets the throne and is angry because his brother the King squanders the royal treasury to help the poor. Eloise proclaims that Elliot, George, and Sedgewick are heroes sent by her father to help rescue her brother.

Though her father is away, Eloise is confident that he is there in spirit. She knows this because George, Elliot, and Sedgewick have the Helpseeker her father created to summon help in case of an emergency. The pirates think there must be some mistake but go with Eloise anyway in search of Prince Alexander. On their way to Robert the Terrible's hideaway, the group faces fierce pirates at the Jolly Joe Inn, encounter Robert the Terrible's crew, and overcome many dangerous obstacles. Eventually Princess Eloise is also captured and the pirates must make a decision—to leave or try to rescue Princess Eloise. At the height of danger, the Helpseeker offers the pirates the chance to go home. They decide to stay and continue the rescue effort. In doing so, they find understanding and encouragement from the messages the blind man gave them. The once fearful Pirates Who Don't Do Anything turn into pirates who do something—overcome their personal struggles, and learn that real heroes do what is right no matter how hard it is.

TARGET AUDIENCE

This program is designed for use with students in preschool through grade 2 as a supplement to the language arts, math, and Bible study curricula.

PROGRAM COMPONENTS

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

1. To generate enthusiasm for the film *The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything – A VeggieTales Movie*.
2. To help students understand that facing our own challenges is an important part of life's great adventure.
3. To help students realize that we can all become heroes by doing what we know is right, no matter how hard it may be.
4. To help students recognize that God is always present, even when we face hardships.
5. To explore the movie's thematic connections to stories in the Bible.
6. To encourage parents to see the movie with their children and to take an active role in discussing it.
7. To reinforce skills in language arts, mathematics, and critical thinking.

HOW TO USE THE PROGRAM COMPONENTS

- ✦ Photocopy the reproducible activity masters that are appropriate for your grade level and provide a set for each student. Make a master copy of the complete program to share with other teachers in your school.
- ✦ Display the enclosed interactive poster in your classroom to generate interest in the program and the movie.
- ✦ The program's activities are designed to be used in the order presented, but you can vary the order to meet your students' needs.
- ✦ Conclude the program by sending copies of the parent letter home with students to share with their parents.

INTRODUCING THE PROGRAM



Introduce the program by pointing out the poster. Tell students that their VeggieTales friends are starring in a new movie called *The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything – A VeggieTales Movie*. In the movie, the characters go back in time to the days when real-life pirates roamed the seas. There they help Princess Eloise

rescue her kidnapped brother Alexander from their evil Uncle Robert who wants to take over the kingdom from their father. Have students identify the characters on the poster and ask them the following questions:

- ✦ Do the characters look like heroes? Why or why not?
- ✦ What do you think a hero looks like?
- ✦ What does it mean to be a hero?
- ✦ What are some words that describe a hero? (brave, wise, honest, etc.)
- ✦ Why do you think the poster says, "They wanted to be heroes. After all, how hard could it be"?
- ✦ Do heroes ever receive help from others? (Explain that God gives heroes their strength, courage, and other special gifts.)
- ✦ Who are your heroes? Why? Give students some examples of heroes from the Bible, like David, Moses, and Jonah.

ACTIVITIES

Activity 1 SET SAIL FOR ADVENTURE

Objectives

- ✦ To introduce students to the main characters in the movie and to set the tone for the upcoming adventure with their VeggieTales friends.
- ✦ To help younger students recognize shapes and develop small motor coordination.
- ✦ To help older students develop reading vocabulary by learning some nautical terms.

Preschool/Kindergarten

In this activity, students learn that God sends us help and gives us strength in difficult situations and sometimes calls on us to help others.

After discussing the poster, pass out the activity sheet and talk about the shapes at the bottom of the page with the characters pictured inside. Then explain to the children that they are going to cut out the shapes featuring the characters and paste them on the corresponding shapes on the ship so that they are ready to set sail to find the evil pirate Robert and rescue Prince Alexander.

Have students share their opinion regarding the following questions.

Do you think it was only luck that sent the Helpseeker to Elliot, George, and Sedgewick? Who really chose them to come to the rescue?

Explain that Eloise's father chose The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything to save the day. Discuss the fact that, like Eloise's father, God sends us help and is there to give us the strength we need in difficult situations.

Then ask students to talk about how God calls us to help others by standing up for friends, helping parents and siblings, and having a positive attitude.

Grades One/Two

In this activity, students learn that God sends us help and gives us strength in difficult situations and calls on us to help others in different ways.

Inform students that they are going to help The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything set sail for their

wind and move the ship forward.

- ✦ **Mast:** tall pole that rises from the deck of a ship and holds the sails.
- ✦ **Anchor:** heavy object, usually attached to ship by a chain, that is lowered to the bottom of the sea to keep the ship from drifting away.
- ✦ **Spyglass:** a small telescope that is used to locate objects at sea such as islands, ships, etc.

Invite students to join the crew as they get ready to sail by learning the parts of the ship listed on the sheet and writing the number of each in the appropriate space.

Answer Key

After viewing the movie, have students share their opinion regarding the following questions found at the bottom of the activity sheet:

Do you think it was only luck that sent the Helpseeker to Elliot, George, and Sedgewick? Who really chose them to come to the rescue?

Explain that Eloise's father chose The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything to save the day. Discuss the fact that, like Eloise's father, God sends us help and is there to give us the strength we need in difficult situations. Then ask students to talk about how God calls us to help others through volunteer opportunities, standing up for friends, helping parents and siblings, and having a positive attitude.

Extended Activities

1. Explore some of the many seagoing adventures in the Bible, most of which teach

us to trust in God to see us through the challenges we face in life. Students can compare the stories of Noah, Jonah, and the storm on the Sea of Galilee to recognize the part that faith will play in helping their VeggieTales friends succeed in their quest and why they set out on a ship called *Steadfast*.

2. Explain to students that pirate captains kept detailed logs describing different aspects of their voyages, from the weather to the different places they visited. Ask students to pretend they are captains of their own pirate ships and have them create an entry about an imaginary day on the high seas. To help students get started, talk about the many

things they might encounter, both pleasurable and dangerous. List students' comments on the chalkboard. These might include storms, fog, no wind, pirates, beautiful rainbows or sunsets, pods of whales, dolphins, other ships, etc. Younger students might draw a picture and write a caption for their log entry. Older students can write brief descriptions for their entries.

Activity 2 HEROES FIND A WAY

Objectives


- ✦ To help students understand that facing their own challenges is an important part of life's great adventure.
- ✦ To help students realize they can overcome their own struggles in life with the help of God, who is always with them.

Preschool/Kindergarten

In this activity, students learn that anyone can be a hero by choosing to do what is right and accepting God's help. He sometimes sends us signs to let us know that he is with us always.

Explain to students that the Pirates Who Don't Do Anything do not see themselves as heroes. Their own shortcomings make them think they cannot help Eloise, but through their adventure, they find that they can overcome these obstacles and be heroes. Signs along the way help encourage and strengthen them. (The signs of a crab, a lever, and a donkey are shown on the map. These appear in the movie as well.)


Invite students to help the three pirates – Elliot, George, and Sedgewick – overcome their struggles by taking them through the maze past the mechanical sea monster, the cheese curls, and the pirate Robert the Terrible.



Grades One/Two

This activity helps students learn that everyone can be a hero. We all have struggles to overcome in life, but with the help of God we can succeed at choosing to do what is right.

Explain to students that in the movie *The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything – A VeggieTales Movie*, Eloise believes that Elliot, George, and Sedgewick are heroes. The three pirates don't agree, but she insists because she has great faith in her father. She believes in them because they have the Helpseeker that her father created for use in emergencies. It is a sign to her that her father watches over her even though he is far away.



adventure. To do so, they need to know some ship terms. Write the following terms on the chalkboard or chart paper and talk about their definitions.

- ✦ **Helm:** wheel by which a ship is steered.
- ✦ **Crow's Nest:** small, partly enclosed platform near the top of the ship's mast used for a lookout.
- ✦ **Prow:** forward part of a ship.
- ✦ **Poop Deck:** raised deck in stern (back) of a ship.
- ✦ **Sails:** shaped sheets of fabric that catch the

As you pass out the activity sheets, tell students that they are going to learn more about the pirates and the virtues that helped them overcome their fears. Each pirate's word maze includes two words — the antagonist he most fears and the virtue that helps him save the day. Have students draw lines from square to square (Boggle™-style) to spell these words.

Extended Activities

1. Signs play an important role in many Bible stories, from the rainbow God sent to Noah to the star that marked the Wise Men's way to Bethlehem. Students can discuss how such signs remind us that God is always there to help us on our life's adventure, and how the challenges we face can also help guide us by giving us the chance to choose our way. Students might share how they and their families have met such challenges and what they have gained through the experience.
2. Talk about the Helpseeker and how it helped both Eloise and George. (It brought the three pirates to help rescue Eloise and her brother and it gave George the courage and motivation he needed to stand up for himself and others.) Then have the class work together to create their own Helpseeker message—a reminder that God is always present to help them overcome their fears and struggles. Post the students' encouraging message in a prominent place in the classroom.

Activity 3 A HERO'S REWARD

Objectives

- ✦ To help students learn the truth about what it means to be a hero.
- ✦ To encourage students to consider ways they can be heroes and to work on being heroes in their everyday lives.

Preschool/Kindergarten

In this activity *The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything* help students discover the true meaning of heroism and how to be a hero today. Introduce the activity by asking children to name their heroes (superheroes, community helpers, family members, etc.) and why they think these people are heroes. Ask students to elaborate

on why these heroes do the things they do (want to help others, want to do what is right).

As you pass out the activity sheet, ask students to complete the dot-to-dot picture to find out who is rewarding the pirates for their heroism and why they are being rewarded. Explain that the pirates are being rewarded because they made the decision to stay and help Eloise, even when they had the chance to go home rather than face danger.

Once students have completed the dot-to-dot and learned the meaning of heroism, help them brainstorm ways they might become heroes in their everyday lives (obey parents, be good to others, help others in need, etc.). Help students write their answers in the box.

Grades One/Two

In this activity students discover the true meaning of heroism – the same lesson that *The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything* learned on their high-seas adventure. Introduce the activity by talking about how heroes are rewarded. Invite students to give their ideas based on prior knowledge and what they have learned from the activities in this program. For example, some are given monetary awards or medals. Explain that, more importantly, heroes often experience help in return, as was the case of the *Pirates Who Don't Do Anything*, who overcame their struggles while helping Princess Eloise and her brother Prince Alexander. In addition, many heroes feel good just knowing that they did what was right, no matter how difficult the task.

When you pass out the activity sheet, ask students to find out the true meaning of heroism by unscrambling the words in

the King's proclamation. Explain that the pirates are heroes because they made the choice to do what was right, even when they had the chance to go home rather than face danger. As a result, George learned to stand up for himself; Elliot overcame his fears; and Sedgewick no longer tried to avoid hard work.

Once students discover the meaning of heroism, let them know that, like Elliot, George, and Sedgewick, they can all be heroes, too. Then discuss ways they might accomplish this. One way might be to identify a fear or insecurity they would like to overcome, such as fear of the dark, fear of talking to other children, feeling they aren't good at something, etc. Help students set goals for overcoming obstacles and brainstorm ways they might meet their goals. Encourage them to write a pledge to commit to their goals. Check with them often to see how they are doing and to give support.

Answer Key

Proclamation Message: A hero does what he knows is right, no matter how hard it may be.

Extended Activities

1. There are many Bible stories that teach us how true heroism depends on living according to God's plan by doing what we know is right, no matter how hard it may be. Students can explore this concept further through the stories of David and Goliath, Samson and Delilah, Job, or the Temptation in the Wilderness, and in the lives of Christian heroes today.
2. Have a VeggieTales Day on which you show VeggieTales videos or read VeggieTales books and have students identify the heroes in the stories and the lessons they learned from these heroes.

PARENT LETTER




SET SAIL FOR ADVENTURE






Activity **1**






- ✦ Talk about why The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything have been given that name and what might happen if they were suddenly given a challenging task to do.
