#### How to Use the Program

This program can be used by teachers, parents, and caregivers. Make photocopies of the activity sheets to use in class or email them to families to use at home. Do the same with the take-home letter for parents/caregivers to extend the learning. Students will need pencils, crayons, and scissors. In class, help children by reading each activity aloud while pointing to each word.

## **Activity 1: Spread Confidence**

In this activity, students discover the joy and boost in confidence that comes with spreading kindness. Begin the activity by asking students to turn and talk to their neighbor about what makes a good friend or a good teammate. Ask each pair of students to share their ideas. Make a class list of key words students use, such as fair, shares, understanding. Encourage students to use these words to talk about themselves.

Next, distribute the activity sheet and assign new partners. Read the words on the activity sheet aloud and review their meanings. Next, have students use words from the list or from your class list to write a word or sentence on the medal to celebrate their partner. Have students cut out their medals. Students could glue yarn to the medals to wear them. Then, take a picture of the whole class wearing their medals or display the medals in the classroom to celebrate each student's positive traits. Students might even create a medal for themselves to promote self-confidence.

As an extension, students can tally how many times they use the positive words the class brainstormed by putting a star or tally mark on the class list. When a class goal of positive language has been reached, the class can have a special surprise, like extra game time or buddy reading time.

### **Activity 2: Never Doubt What You Love**

This activity helps students identify and explore what they love. Begin by asking students to share things they love to do, people they love, and things they love. Make a three-column chart of their answers. Allow students to write their initials next to their top choice of all the things listed. As an alternative, have the student fill in a sentence on a class chart. Example: \_\_\_\_\_\_ loves \_\_\_\_\_.

Next, have students use the activity sheet to share more things they love. They can color in as many hearts as they like to show what they love, and then add their own cherished item, person, or activity to the last empty heart.

As a math extension, tally the class votes for each image on the sheet. A class bar graph can be made using an extra set of the images. Also, encourage students to ask their families to help them distribute cards or messages to family or friends to further spread their love.

## **Activity 3: What's Your Favorite?**

Explore what makes your class unique with this community-building activity. Begin by talking with students about a time when someone had a different opinion than them or wanted to play a different game. How did they handle it? Discuss how different opinions can help us get new ideas.

Next, have students answer the questions on the activity sheet. Read the questions and answer choices to younger students and have them follow along. When done, compare answers as a class. Talk about how we're all different and why accepting differences is important. After the discussion, ask students to talk to a partner and find something that they do and do not have in common. Explain how our differences can help us try new things, learn, solve problems, and grow.





What do you love? Look at the pictures below.


