Poppin Popcorn Festival

For centuries, festivals have inspired communities around the world to come together in celebration. And popcorn, a centuries-old grain that remains one of the most popular snacks today, has played an integral part in creating many festival memories and traditions.

To celebrate Popcorn Poppin' Month in October, The Popcorn Board and the curriculum specialists at Young Minds Inspired have developed this free educational program to introduce your students to the history of popcorn and inspire them to make plans for their own **Poppin' Popcorn Festival**.

These standards-based, easy-to-implement activities for grades 4–8 challenge students to imagine how they would make popcorn the star of a "could-be" festival event. Some might create unique popcorn recipes for festival tasting tents, others might create games, rides, dances, songs, and more to engage your whole school community in the fun and excitement of popcorn. Best of all, planning a Poppin' Popcorn Festival can inspire your students to enter the annual Popcorn Pep Club Contest for the chance to win cash prizes for your school — \$10,000 in prizes will be awarded to schools!

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- Introduce students to the history and nutritional facts of popcorn
- Spark creative thinking and collaboration as students make plans for a "could-be" popcorn festival
- Encourage students to enter the Popcorn Pep Club Contest

HOW TO USE THE PROGRAM

Distribute photocopies of the two activity sheets. Organize students into pairs or small groups to create concepts for a fun popcorn festival. Students will need internet access, markers, paper, and other media to present their ideas. Connect with your colleagues in science, art, and health to make this a fun cross-curricular learning experience.

ACTIVITY 1: WELCOME TO THE POPPIN' POPCORN FESTIVAL!

To introduce the program, ask students what they think of when they hear the word "popcorn." Do they have memories of making popcorn? Favorite ways to eat it? Next, ask what they think of when they hear the word "festival." Responses might include fun, food, entertainment, rides, and craft exhibits. Finally, ask what could happen if you put all these thoughts together. Tell students they are going to find out by coming up with their own original ideas for a Poppin' Popcorn Festival!

Group students in pairs or small teams and review the activity sheet, which lists some themes for attractions that could be part of a popcorn festival. Depending on your class, you might let students choose a theme, assign different themes to each team, or let them brainstorm their own ideas.

To get their creative ideas popping, have students research popcorn to learn more about its history, how it is grown, its nutrition, and its many uses. Each team will write a description of the attraction they would create for a popcorn festival.

ACTIVITY 2: LET THE FESTIVITIES BEGIN!

This activity guides students from concept to design as they work as a team to present their ideas for a festival attraction. You might want to assign a common presentation format, such as a poster, brochure, model, slide presentation, or video, or let students choose their own formats.

The activity sheet provides prompts to help students plan and build their concept presentation. In addition, for consistency, teams might vote on colors and other common features to be included in each presentation. Once done, the presentations can be combined to create a class display for a Poppin' Popcorn Festival!

Extension: Since popcorn is a popular snack often associated with fun family time, have students create a poll to ask family and friends about their favorite way to eat popcorn or their favorite memory of popcorn (what do they think of when they think of popcorn?). Poll findings can be incorporated into the festival plans to appeal to what people like.

POPCORN HERITAGE TENT: This agricultural exhibit will celebrate the farming and production of popcorn from seed to snack. Festival goers will learn fun facts about popcorn such as:

- · Most of the world's popcorn is grown in eight states in the U.S.
- Popcorn pops because there is moisture in the kernel that turns to steam and explodes when heated.
- Americans consume some 14 billion quarts of popped popcorn each year.
