- Practice literacy skills, identify story elements, make predictions, and draw inferences
- Encourage independent reading

How to Use This Program

Make photocopies of the activity sheets and family letter. Help students by reading each activity sheet aloud as they follow along. Students will need pencils and/or markers or crayons to complete the activities. Activity 2 will require chart paper or a whiteboard along with blank paper for each student. Send home the family letter, post it on your website, or email it to parents and caregivers.

ACTIVITY 1: WHAT MAKES A STORY?

Begin with a class discussion about story elements. Explain that every good fiction story has three important parts: 1. *character(s)*, people, animals, or fantasy creatures; 2. *setting*, place(s) where the story action occurs; and 3. *plot*, all the events in a story that lead to solving a problem for the character(s). Next, review a book the students have read and help them identify the story elements.

Distribute the activity sheet and read it with your students. Next, help students identify their favorite book, write its title on the blank line, and use the remaining space to draw a poster depicting the three story elements of the book. Students may then share their work with one another during a large group discussion.

This activity sheet may be re-used often as students read more books independently or as a class.

ACTIVITY 2: MEET THE CHARACTERS!

Lead students in a discussion about the characters from their favorite stories. Ask them to name and describe the characters. Explain that when we read, we learn about the characters from the author. We learn about what they look like on the outside. We also learn what they are like on the inside by how they act and what they say. Write students' ideas on chart paper or a whiteboard, creating columns to distinguish inside and outside traits of their favorite characters.

Next, ask student volunteers to act out an example of a trait for the class to identify. For example, traits such as brave, silly, hardworking, scared, nervous, kind, forgetful, smart, athletic, lovable, mischievous, honest, etc.

Distribute the activity sheet and read it with the students.

Have students practice inference skills by making predictions about the settings and problems/plots the books featuring the three characters might include. For extra fun, have students make predictions about what might happen in a story featuring all three characters. Students may use the back of the activity sheet to draw, then share, pictures based on their ideas.

Tips for Supporting Your Child's Reading at Home

Help reinforce your child's reading efforts at home. Here are some tips to help you.

- Create a Reading Routine. Read with your child every day to support reading fluency.
- Sounds Familiar! Support reading comprehension by talking about story action, characters, and plot/problems in these books. Help your child identify connections to story elements from their real-world experiences.
- Same, but Different. Reinforce critical-thinking skills by talking with your child about similarities and differences between characters and themes of books they reads.
- Set a Reading Goal and Make it FUN! Plan to read a set number of books within a specific time frame and record your progress on the Family Book Challenge Chart below. To start:
 - 1. Take a family vote on how you'll celebrate once the goal is achieved and write it on the chart. (Maybe a movie night, pizza night, or trip to the library to check out more books!)
 - 2. After completing a book, fill in a row on the chart and have your child rate the book by coloring the stars.
 - 3. Have your child draw a picture for each book they read and describe it to you.
