About City Spies by James Ponti

The City Spies books take readers across the globe on top secret missions that could mean life or death — and everything depends on the actions of a handful of kid spies. The series starts as Sara Martinez, better known by her code name "Brooklyn," gets pulled into a secret organization because of her hacking skills.



This organization — the City Spies — is a secret division of MI6 that is made up of spies ranging in age from 8 to 15. Almost immediately, Brooklyn and her four fellow City Spies are roped into a dangerous mission to save the world...and finish their homework. City Spies is jampacked with action and intrigue, humor and heart, and all set against a backdrop of exotic locations and iconic landmarks! How to Use This Program

Make photocopies of the activity sheets to use in the classroom. Share the Čity Spies series synopsis above with students. Use the activities after students read the books as part of classroom or independent reading, or as supplemental language arts activities.

Activity 1: Crack the Code!

Explain to students that they're about to embark on a puzzle-solving mission. Divide students into teams of two or three, pass out the activity sheet, and review the instructions. Set a timer to see how quickly a team can solve the puzzle in Part 1. In Part 2, students create their own spy names and skills.

Answer: Part 1. The alphabet key code is multiples of 3. Motherism: You cannot achieve, what you cannot believe.

Ask students what they think the phrase means. Ask: How does this apply to spy kids? How does this saying apply to people in general?

Extension Activity: Have the teams use the key to create their own encrypted spy codes to share with each other.

Activity 2: Secret Mission: Real-Life Spies

Working in their teams, have students brainstorm qualities a good spy would need to be successful. For example, the ability to blend into a crowd, walk quietly, observe, and react quickly, etc. Discuss the responses.

Next, explain to students that just like the kids in City Spies, they have "spy" homework — they will be digging into the lives of real-life spies. Have students work with their team or individually. Provide a list of spies (examples include Nathan Hale, Virginia Hall, Alan Turing, and Belle Boyd), or invite students to identify a spy they'd like to research on their own. Review the selections for appropriateness before students begin their research.

Direct students to use the activity sheet to collect information on their spy and create a dossier. Students might also create Google slideshows to present their dossiers.

Extension Activity: Have the groups write and illustrate their own spy stories. Offer a story starter such as:

- One day, I got to school and there was a phone in my locker with a note: Call 555-5555 and wait for instructions...
- I woke up one morning and there was a helicopter waiting for me in my yard. A man dressed in a black suit greeted me and asked if I was ready to save the world...

Have students select a major city as their story setting and research information about it to integrate into their writing.

CRACK THE CODE!

The City Spies are a group of kid spies who travel around the globe on missions to save the world — in between going to school and doing homework! The spies are experts at using their resources to figure out solutions to problems and mysteries. The adult who guides the team is a male spy called Mother. Mother invents sayings to help his team remember key spy principles or advice. These sayings are called *motherisms*, and as the kid spies learn, they apply to spying and life in general.
