Encourage your students to become learning stars with this free educational program based on the characters and themes from Disney's new animated film, Wish, arriving only in theaters this Thanksgiving!



About Disney's Wish

Walt Disney Animation Studios' *Wish* is an allnew musical-comedy welcoming audiences to the magical kingdom of Rosas, where Asha, a sharpwitted idealist, makes a wish so powerful that it is answered by a cosmic force — a little ball of boundless energy called Star. Together, Asha and Star confront a most formidable foe — the ruler of Rosas, King Magnifico — to save her community and prove that when the will of one courageous human connects with the magic of the stars, wondrous things can happen. *Wish* opens only in theaters on November 22, 2023.

How to Use This Program

Make photocopies of the activity sheets to use in class or provide them to families to use at home. Also copy and send home the family letter or email it to parents and guardians to extend the learning. In class, help children by reading each activity aloud while students follow along.

Activity One: Wishing on a Star!

Start this activity by asking students if they've ever heard the following rhyme:

Star light, star bright, First star I see tonight I wish I may, I wish I might Have this wish I wish tonight

Ask students:

- What do you think the rhyme means?
- Why do people make wishes on stars?
- Do you think stars are special? Why or why not?

Explain that people have been making wishes on stars for many reasons, for many years.
Ask students what they know about stars.



Distribute the activity sheet and read the introduction about Disney's Wish with students, as well as the science facts about real stars in Part 1. Remind students that a community is the people in an area or group, such as the area where you live. Your school is also a community.

Have students complete Part 2 on the back of the activity sheets. Invite them to share their stars and wishes when done.

Bonus Answer: 25,000,000,000,000 – 12 zeros

Activity Two: My Night Sky

Begin this activity by explaining to students that Asha looks up to the stars to help guide her. (For inspiration, you might also share the movie trailer with students to hear Asha singing "This Wish." Go to ymiclassroom.com/disneywish for the trailer.) Ask students, How do you think the stars help Asha?

Next, ask students to close their eyes and picture the sky during the day. Ask for volunteers to share words that describe the daytime sky.

In comparison, ask students to picture what the sky looks like at night. Prompt students by asking:

- What color is the night sky?
- Is it clear or cloudy?
- Is there some other word that describes how it looks?
- Are there stars in the sky? A moon? If so, how do they look?
- What do you hear?
- Do you smell anything?

Distribute the activity sheet and review the directions with students. Provide them with crayons and markers to create their night sky designs. Challenge older students to use a thesaurus to find alternatives for some common descriptive words.

Once done, invite students to share their artwork and descriptions.

Activity Three: You're a Star!

Wish has classic Disney elements — it's a fairytale with good and

Distribute the activity sheet and read the directions with the class. Review the answers below once students are done. Invite students to share their stars or display them on a bulletin board to celebrate your "Learning Stars."

Answers: Part 1: 1. worms; 2. rooster; 3. dog; 4. chicken (for eggs). Part 2: Answers will vary.

Extension Activities

- Wish Bubble Wall Valentino, Asha's goat, wishes to talk. Asha wishes to help her community. Wishes can be small or big. Have students decide what they would wish for their classmates or community. Assign each student the name of a classmate or consider making wishes for your school or greater community. Provide students with large circle cutouts ("bubbles") to write their wishes on. Once done, create a Wishing Wall with the wish bubbles.
- Word Challenge Have students work in teams to see how many words they can make out of these terms or phrases: solar system, billions of stars, or Milky Way Galaxy.
- Star Magic As a class, create your own fairytales about wishes. Have students work in groups or create a class story together. Add a twist with a wish mix-up. Use one of these prompts to help students start their stories:
 - o My best friend (or sibling) and I each made a wish on a star last night. I wished for _ _. My friend wished for _____. When I woke up this morning, I was very confused because ...
 - O Star light, star bright, first star I see tonight, I wish that my dog could talk. When I looked from the sky back to my dog, nothing changed. Then suddenly, my dog said ...

Wishing on a Star!

Asha is an adventurous young woman who lives in the magical Kingdom of Rosas where wishes actually come true.

One night, when Asha wishes on a star, her wish is so powerful that it is answered by a little ball of boundless energy called Star.

Working together, Asha and Star (along with Asha's pajama-wearing goat Valentino) set out to give the wishing power back to their whole community.

Part 1. Star is a character in the fairytale described above. But what are *real* stars that you see in the sky? Put your science hat on and read the questions and answers below.

• What is a star?

A star is a ball of gas. It contains helium and hydrogen.

Why do stars shine?

Stars shine when the hydrogen changes to helium. This creates energy and makes the star really hot and bright.

• Is the Sun a star?

Yes. The Sun is the closest star to Earth.

How far away are stars from Earth?

The Sun is 93 million miles away from Earth. The next closest star is Alpha Centauri. It's about 25 trillion miles away.

• Can stars really fall from the sky?

No. "Shooting stars" are not actually stars. They are meteors. They burn up in Earth's atmosphere, creating a bright tail of light.

BONUS! How many zeros are in 25 trillion when written as a number?

Part 2. Imagine looking up at the billions of stars in the sky. What would you wish for? On the back of this sheet, draw your own star. Then write your wish under your star.

Families: What would you wish upon a star? Discover how Asha, Valentino, and Star help people in Rosas with their wishes. See Disney's Wish, only in theaters this Thanksgiving.


My Night Sky



Dear Parents and Guardians,

In school, your child has been learning about stars, self-reflection, friendship, and community with activities from Disney and the curriculum specialists at Young Minds Inspired based on characters and themes from the new animated film, Disney's Wish. Ask your child about the activities. Then, extend the learning at home with some fun family activities!

Holiday Wishes – Over the holidays, have your child cut out large circles from construction paper to make bubbles for wishes. Write the name of one person who will be celebrating with you on each circle, and place a circle under each person's dinner plate or pass them out, ensuring that no one gets their own name. Each person will write a wish for the coming year for the person whose name is on the bubble. Extend this by having each family member write their own wish as well and post them on the refrigerator.

You're a Star! – Celebrate everyone in the family by creating large paper star cutouts, writing the name of a family member in the center of the star, and having each person write a word or quality on the star shape that makes the named person a star!

Explore the Stars – Take an evening walk or sit outdoors and look at the sky to see how many constellations you can find and identify. About Disney's Wish

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Estimados padres y tutores:

En la escuela, su hijo ha estado aprendiendo sobre las estrellas, la autorreflexión, la amistad y la comunidad con actividades de Disney y con los especialistas en planes de estudios de Young Minds Inspired basadas en los personajes y temas de *Wish*, la nueva película animada de Disney. Pregúntele a su hijo sobre las actividades y comparta el aprendizaje a su hogar con algunas actividades divertidas para la familia.

Deseos para las fiestas: durante las fiestas, pídale a su hijo que corte círculos grandes de cartulina para hacer burbujas de deseos. Escriba el nombre de las personas que van a celebrar las fiestas con usted en cada círculo.
