How to Use This Guide

- 1. Display the poster in your classroom to generate interest in marine careers.
- 2. Make photocopies of the activity sheets to use in class or email them to families to use at home.
- 3. Use the information in this teacher's guide to present each activity. Review the answers and invite students to share their learnings.
- 4. Use the digital magazine and digital quiz in class or provide families with the links to extend the learning at home.
- 5. Provide students and families with copies of the career resources and planning handouts.
- 6. Introduce additional lessons from the in-depth digital teaching kit, if time permits, to enrich learning about marine career opportunities.

ACTIVITY 1: All Hands on Deck



Explain to students that the marine industry is a unique place for young people to dive right into career-building work experience. There is job training available to prepare young people with and without a college degree to get on board. Using the poster, discuss the variety of jobs available on a yacht.

Next, distribute the activity sheet and have students work in groups to identify job skills necessary for each job. Answers may vary and many skills will overlap. Discuss how each crew member has a unique role but must also be ready to pitch in to help the team.

ACTIVITY 2: Find Your Fit

Have students work in groups to brainstorm their individual strengths and interests and then complete the quiz to discover a yachting role that might suit them. Refer to the poster for more details about the types of positions available on a vessel.

After finding a potential fit, students can explore websites listed on the career resources handout to find positions that match their interests and skills.

As an extension, students can create a spreadsheet of their job experience and goals. As they complete a goal, students can add it to their work experience.

ACTIVITY 3: That's Marine Lingo!

The marine industry has some unique language and terms used to communicate and describe vessels. Using your classroom as a "yacht," ask students to identify the stern, bow, aft, midship, port, and starboard. Next, challenge students to match the marine terms and definitions on the activity sheet and complete the expository writing activity describing a yacht and crew.

All Hands on Deck

Looking for an exciting career? Interested in seeing the world? Opportunities await in the marine industry.

Go below deck to learn what makes a complete crew for life on the water. Read about the roles of the crew members on a yacht. Brainstorm what skills, including qualities and experience, each role might require. Then, on the line under each job, write the numbers of the skills you think are needed. Skills can be used more than once.





Crew Member

Captain: Navigates the vessel, supervises the crew, including hiring and firing. Responsible for the vessel and all lives on board.*

Chef: Plans and executes incredible culinary experiences for the guests. Supervises the galley.*



Bosun: Supervises deckhands, making sure they keep the yacht ship-shape for guests. The bosun also sets up water sports for guests.*

Deckhand: Supports the bosun in keeping the deck clean, safe, and attractive.



Chief Steward/ess: Responsible for supervising all the hospitality on board, from room set up to food service to entertainment.*

Steward/ess: Supports the chief steward/ess, interacts professionally with guests, and keeps interior of vessel clean and inviting.



Engineers: Maintain the engine, audio-visual equipment, and all other electronics and machinery on board.*

Planning for the Future

Embark on Your Career at Sea

If a career in yachting sounds like something you might be interested in, you can get ready for the adventure on land! Skills you develop on shore are valuable to employers who want to create luxury aboard yachts and other vessels. Strong skills and experience in hospitality, fishing, and water sports can make you a more attractive crew member.

- Love hospitality? Take a job at a restaurant to get experience serving or working in the kitchen. Hotel work can also give you experience for being part of the interior team.
- Feel at home underwater? Get scuba or diving certified.
- Fishing trips your idea of paradise? Learn more about how to lead groups on excursions.
- Enjoy fixing things? Working with any kind of engine or electronics can open doors.









Ready to get started?

There are some requirements from the U.S. Coast Guard for any potential crew member.

- Apply for a Transportation Worker Identification Credential (TWIC) card at www.tsa.gov/twic
 - You must be 19 to begin this process.*
 - This will include a fee and background check, but is necessary for anyone working on the water in the U.S.
- Make an appointment at a TWIC application center. You will need a driver's license, birth certificate, or passport, and the fee amount, which varies.
- Look into a training school as some positions on board require specialized training and certifications. For example, Basic Safety Training qualification comprises five modules which include personal survival training, firefighting, first aid and CPR, personal safety and social responsibility, and proficiency in security awareness. Navigates the vessel, supervises the crew, including hiring and firing. Responsible for the vessel and all lives on board.




CHEF

Responsible for supervising all the hospitality on board, from room set up to food service to entertainment.


STEWARD/ESS
